Saying Thank You...

"Tis the season" - as the goblins masks, witches' hats, and the jack -o-lanterns are put up for another year, pumpkins remain, corn stalks hold over in the yard, cornucopias are displayed, and thoughts turn to Thanksgiving.

We were taught as children to always say "thank you" when it was appropriate. It was just the kind and respectful thing to do. I learned at a young age saying thanks was a way to honor another - no matter whether it was for a sandwich one just made you or a much needed loan that was given by an officer at the bank. We honor others by showing a gentle consideration of them as persons. We revere them by treating them as we would like to be treated.

St. Paul once wrote to the church at Thessalonica (1 Thess. 5:8) to give thanks in every situation.

It's hard to do sometimes, no doubt. But, we must.

Thank God for every moment and circumstance. Thank Him for the privilege to live this life no matter what you've experienced or what lies ahead. We all will be better people because of it.

In our time in Nashville, Mary Alice and I have truly appreciated

our time with David, Ashley, Lennon, and Taylor. In this time away, and in my pastoral fervor, I'm still somewhat in my teaching mode. This is the time for confirmation studies back home, and well, I miss that very much. So, poor Lennon becomes my student some of the time! No, he hasn't been given his own small catechism (yet!), but I have been trying to build on the foundations that David and Ashley have already laid for him and his sister.

He's pretty good about saying "thank you" and "you're welcome" when it is appropriate. Saying thanks to God is very important as well. So, before we eat our meals, we say a very simple prayer: Thank you for the food, Amen. (When you're three, you start small.) I even attempted to make a pancake one morning with the reminder for him (and me!) to give thanks, amen!

The thing with Lennon is when he prays, he uses a normal voice for the thanking part, but when it comes to the "Amen," it is often at the top of his lungs. What is so cool is when Mary Alice or I have given him a snack in, say, midafternoon (which doesn't always require a prayer), it's Lennon

who says the prayer with a loud and booming "Amen!" Thus, the student becomes the teacher!

And, St. Paul said, pray in every situation. Thank you, Lennon, for teaching me this again. Let us learn a lesson from it as well. Pray without ceasing and thank God in everything and every day.

With the celebration of Thanksgiving only a few short weeks away, let us give thanks; let us shout a loud "Amen!" and let the Lord know our true gratefulness.

"An Ashley Update"

To our Congregational Family,

Grace and Peace are yours in abundance! Amen.

At this writing, we are passing "mid-term" in the process of Ashley's surgeries by now, and we are grateful for the continued support of our congregational family. You have truly been wonderful to us all!

Ashley received a bit of a break for one week from her weekly procedures for reconstructive surgery. What has been done these past few weeks is temporary, but can still be very painful and confining for her. Her final reconstructive surgery will take place along with her hysterectomy next month.

This week (in which I am writing) she did not have the procedure, so, it's been a better week for her. She goes tomorrow (October 18) for her final injections, etc. before having time off to prepare and get stronger for her two surgeries on November 8. This second set of surgeries will take a lot out of her, so, Mary Alice and I are beginning to see the need for getting ourselves ready for an even more full-time presence with the children.

Lennon usually makes it through the night with no problem, but little Taylor still has a hard time with sleeping all night. She has just begun to take more and more solid food during the day and her ability to sleep longer hours may be starting to show. This will be helpful in the days after the surgery as Ashley will not be able to get up at night as she is able right now. Naps for us during the day are not possible with a 3-year old

and 8-month old, so an early-to-bed motif is beginning to be a priority for us. We will be ready!

Our hope is that Ashley's healing process will be similar to last time, even though it's a very different surgery. We are planning to remain with them in Nashville until around the 8th of December (+ or -) depending on her continued needs. Keep us all in your prayers that she does heal as she should and there are no complications.

We haven't been devoid of "getting away" while here in middle Tennessee. We have taken a trip to the Knoxville Zoo to meet all the other grandchildren, during their fall break. David and I were able to go to a Sunday afternoon music festival in Franklin in September. We have had a few excursions in and around the Nashville area, as long as they can be done in between naps for Taylor and pre-school time for Lennon (and when we can work it out and have David available from work). Mary Alice and I have had some time to meet up with my brother, Skip, and his wife, Sheila—usually for Sunday brunch after church. It's true, our car knows its own way to Walmart - which is the most mileage it has seen these past weeks, it seems!

I am still very, very grateful to our staff for all their hard work and love for the congregation. We all are so blessed to have them as our leaders at OSLC and the community-at-large!

Keep those prayers going. We feel them every day. We love and miss you very much, and look forward to seeing you sometime in Advent!

Faithful Giving

St. Paul wrote to his young friend, a new pastor, whose name was Timothy, to give him some of his wisdom of the world as Timothy himself travelled away from the familiar territory of his own home land. The old apostle had so much advice; it took two letters to get it all to him!

In I Timothy 6:18-19, Paul wrote: "...be rich in good works, generous, and ready to share, thus storing up for themselves the treasure of a good foundation for the future, so that they may take hold of the life that really is life..."

What great advice! It's so easy in our day-to-day lives to forget what life is really all about. It's very easy to get caught up in our own needs and wants that we forget what is most important.

Paul tells his young friend to always be rich in good works, that is, be ready to share them at any moment. When he talks of generosity, he means with every worldly thing we possess, not only in sharing our talents and willingness to work for others, but also with our money.

Money can blind us sometimes to the real truth that life can offer. Sometimes people can lose sight of what's real in the life of Christian ministry, because they're afraid they won't have enough to go around.

Here at OSLC, we are offering each one of you what we call "faith giving." We're not going to burden you with a lot of statistics and challenges of what "you ought to do" to help us do ministry in 2017. We want to give you the chance to decide for yourselves. What you and I do with our money is totally up to us, but what Paul is teaching is how our possessions (yes, including money) can hold us back to see the real life we can live in Christ, or can open up a whole new realm of possibilities to share the love of Christ.

Mary Alice and I find that the more of our in-

come that is committed to help us live our lives (our tithe, other benevolences, our monthly bills, groceries, auto payments, mortgages, etc.), the better we manage what we have been given. What we have left over, we have saved some of it, but most of it we have returned to God. And, we feel wonderful about it because it can be spiritually freeing to do it.

You have had congregational councils in the past number of years who have always been tremendous stewards of putting your money to use. They have cut corners and worked hard in other ways to bring costs down to make your hard earned money go further. We have budgets that have not had great increases in recent years as a way to try and use our monetary gifts as wisely as we can. Your council is very sensitive to how stewardship is managed in our lives together. I'm certainly proud of their work.

SOFFERING

I'm very grateful to you for your gifts, and to our leaders who have been good stewards with what you have given them to do the work, over these many years. But now - we're giving you the chance to freely decide what you can do to help strengthen the ministry of Our Saviour Lutheran Church. We know that you would like to sense the "real life" Paul is referring to, one of a strong faith and committed hearts to the work of Jesus Christ. There are many challenges ahead for our parish. I hope you will take this open-ended opportunity to challenge yourselves and your other family members to pray hard and make personal and spiritual commitments that are between you and God. Let God quide you to find what the real life means for you.

Now we are into the "party" mode with the official welcoming of the 500th anniver-

sary of the Lutheran Church on Reformation Day! Wahoo! Let's do it! I am so very excited about this coming year and learning about Dr. Luther, his writings, and our Faith in the Lord Jesus! (Many of you have heard me say that "everyone should be Lutheran." As Melissa says, "Go God!")

In celebration of Luther's music, let's look at two of his more familiar hymns. These are hymns that we know and use here at OSLC: "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God" and "Savior of the Nations, Come."

Lovingly called "The Lutheran National Anthem," "Ein feste Burg ist unser Gott" is first found in a 1533 hymnal but may have been used as early as 1527. The text is based on Psalm 46. Luther focuses on the strength and surety of our Lord – nothing can prevail against God – we are safe in that "rock." The strong tune fortifies the words. In our ELW hymnal there are two musical versions of "A Mighty Fortress." #503 frolics almost into a dancelike style. We (as long as I have been at OSLC) have not sung this version – should I surprise you someday?


#504 is the version we all know and love. The rhythm is "square" giving it the solidarity and

strength inherent in the stirring words. "The Kingdom's ours forever." Wow! No wonder we use this hymn at funerals! Looking at the text, however, this hymn can be used at any time (the basic black and pearls of hymnody)!

"Savior of the Nations, Come" (Non komm, der Heiden Heiland) ELW#263 is found in the Advent section of our hymnal. We ask God for the Savior – to come into our lives and fill us with the holy light that only God can give. Again death is overcome and we once again become God's "home." What a wonderful way to sing the Advent of Jesus – culminating with the doxology of praise in verse 6. First appearing in 1524, Luther reworked a plainchant changing the rhythm and translating the Latin into German.

"I truly desire that all Christians would love and regard as worthy the lovely gift of music, which is a precious, worthy, and costly treasure given

to mankind by God...This precious gift has been given to man alone that he might thereby remind himself that God has created man for the express purpose of praising and extolling God."




The Cover Girls


